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Course Objective:

This course will look at how reality is constructed in society. Specifically, we will focus on the reality constructions of fear, violence and crime in U.S society. What role does crime and violence play in the construction of our daily lives and vice versa? What role does the media play in this process?

Grading:

Grading for this course will be broken down into two components: 1) A research paper (50%) and; 2) active learning (50%).

- 1) The research paper for this course will focus on the question what is crime? Papers should be 12-15 pages in length, double-spaced. You should focus on one topic and discuss how this topic constructs the reality of crime for society. You are free to choose a topic that we discuss in class this semester, or choose something different. Papers should contain a minimum of 10 sources as well as a data collection section. Specific requirements will be discussed in class. Papers will be due in class on December 1, 2000. Please note: Late papers will not be accepted. Papers should be written clearly, free of grammatical errors and all sources should be clearly cited.
- 2) The "active learning" component of your grade will be comprised of journal assignments, a group presentation, meetings with me, and most importantly, your contributions to class discussions.
 - a) Journal assignments will consist of writing and respond to at least one question or issue that arises for you in each of the assigned readings. These assignments will provide not only fuel for class discussions, but may contribute to the formulation of your research paper. Your journal can simply be a part of your notebook. I recommend using a binder versus a spiral notebook as I may ask you to hand in your assignments from time to time. I may also pose a question during our class discussions and ask you to respond to it for our next class. Journal assignments are meant to be informal and provide a space in your notebooks for critical thinking.
 - b) At the end of each topic, a class period has been allocated for group presentations. You will be divided into groups of six (6) and will be responsible for presenting some of the major issues of the topic. Do not simply restate the lecture and reading material. Additional research is required. How you choose to present your topic is entirely up to you. I encourage you to be creative. Some suggestions may include: organizing a class debate of an issue, showing video clips, breaking the class into small discussion groups to break up issues, role playing, etc. I request that groups schedule a time to meet with me prior to your presentation date so that we can discuss your plan for the class session together.
 - c) You will also be required to meet with me twice throughout the semester to discuss you progress on your research paper. Dates and times for these meetings will be announced in class. Of course, you are welcome and encouraged to meet with me more often. My office hours are by appointment or you can always chat with me before and after class.

d) It is my expectation that you will attend each class session, that you will arrive on time, and that you will remain in class for the entire class period. However, showing up to class is one thing; asking questions, participating in discussions about lecture and readings and being (or at least looking!) interested is another. If you tend to be quiet in class, please plan on sending me regular e-mail messages or scheduling appointments to meet with me to chat about the readings or to let me know what you're finding interesting or puzzling.

For those of you who are concerned about grades, if you do everything satisfactorily in the class, you can expect a grade in the "C" range. To receive an "A" in this course, you must go above and beyond the requirements, push yourself beyond your own limits and stand out about the crowd.
